Through these sponsorships, tobacco companies are reaching millions of young Formula 1 fans around the world. Decades of science shows [this type of marketing and sponsorship appeals to kids](#), who are particularly vulnerable to these harmful and addictive products. Like other tobacco products, these pouch products contain nicotine, which is highly addictive, [can harm the developing adolescent brain](#), and can prime the brain for addiction to other drugs.

The risk of these tobacco product sponsorships reaching large numbers of youth is substantial. Formula 1 has made no secret of its efforts to expand its youth audience. In its [2025 Global Fan Survey](#), Formula 1 touted the growth of its young fanbase, stating that “Gen Z is helping shape the rhythm of modern fandom, engaging with the sport more frequently and on a deeper emotional level.” Formula 1 has also partnered with youth-oriented brands, including [Disney, Lego and Hot Wheels](#), to expand its reach and appeal to kids. According to a recent [news report](#), “More than 4 million children aged 8 to 12 now actively follow Formula 1 across the EU and US, an audience that didn’t exist five years ago.”

By sponsoring Formula 1 teams, tobacco companies are seeking to reach the same young people Formula 1 has worked hard to attract. Formula 1 must not be complicit in these efforts. To protect the health of its young fans, it is imperative that Formula 1 act quickly to update its existing prohibition of cigarette sponsorships to include other types of tobacco products, including newer products like nicotine pouches.
